This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

- Sports4Kids to continue to deliver PE lessons and to allow class teachers to observe in order to engage in quality CPD to enhance their own knowledge and skills (especially the ones whose PE lessons aren't covered by S4K.)
- All teachers to be sent the assessment characters by the subject leader to be displayed around the classroom and in the hall for anyone to refer to during lessons.
- S4K to ensure all planning for September is saved on TEAMS for anyone to access.
- S4K/subject leader to deliver small INSET session to staff to explain the assessment in PE.
- Create a progression of vocabulary document which shows the key vocabulary to be used and referred to for each sport in each year group and be made available on TEAMS for all to access if needed.

- Improved teacher subject knowledge.
- Pupils enjoy their PE lessons, and most children feel confident taking part in physical activity (based on pupil interviews)
- Subject leader conducted a PE Deep Dive and reported key information back to teachers and S4K coaches including assessment and delivery of PE.
- Observations, Deep Dive, speaking to Teachers and Pupil interviews showed that there was a lack of vocabulary used when lessons were taught by staff not from S4K.
- Another staff member has been trained in swimming so we now have 3 members of staff trained to teach swimming if needed.
- Teachers to be more aware and confident of the assessment process in PE.

- Sports4Kids and Teachers to work collaboratively to assess pupil's confidence and competence within all areas of the curriculum to measure impact over time.
- Seek more opportunities for teachers to develop CPD from free coaching courses.

- Edge Hill PE students and Teaching students providing lunch clubs across the year groups and also supporting with after school clubs which has allowed some of the activities to be opened up to KS1 and KS2.
- Year 6 sports leaders support with different classes during lunch time.
- Purchased equipment and resources to offer access to new sports/physical activities as relevant both in lessons and at lunch times.
- SEND opportunities available throughout the year Inc the KS2 learning and discovery festival participation which allows SEN children to engage and practice in a range of sports and activities.
- Sports on the MTP and LTP tweaked to cover sports and activities that haven't been done for a while to help with variety and coverage.
- Possibly a member of staff from S4K to deliver a cheerleading or dance club.
- Chance to Shine cricket organized for May 2023 to deliver taster sessions to KS2 children.

- Extra-curricular clubs with S4K coaches (before and after school) include multi-Sports, dodgeball, rounders, football, rugby, multiskills etc.
- Registers to show number of children participating in extra-curricular activity each week
- New equipment purchased to support with the teaching and learning of PE and sports day e.g., Egg and spoons, bean bags, hoola hoops, cones etc
- Monitoring the roll out of the new timetable for football and equipment box days on the yard at lunch time for children.
- New PE Mats for gymnastics are still on the list to be purchased in some way as the quality of the other ones in the hall aren't really up to standard.
- New clubs such as cheerleading or dance organized to offer even more of a range to children; especially girls.

- When possible, run intra-house competitions within classes i.e. Y4 and 5. Edge Hill PE students have been running mini tournaments within classes.
- Continue to enter Level 2 competitions in various sports.
- transport to and from competitions This is currently being done through staff and parents taking children.
- Contribution to SHAPES organisation to help with the cost of running competitions across St Helens.

Taking part in the Pilkington Recs rugby tournament with other schools in St Helen's in collaboration with Saints

- Sports Day and intra-school competitions engaged whole school in Level 1 competition.
- Record of inter-school competition.
